




Concentration of Social Services

Policing Issues & Homelessness Snapshot

- 960 Homeless in Ottawa (First week of April 2008) used a shelter
- Reportedly 70% have addiction and Mental Health Issues
- Aggressive Panhandling
- Open Alcohol & Drug Use
- Squatting
- Harm Reduction Discards

Homelessness & Addiction

- Drug Projects targeting open drug use in and around Social Service Agencies
- Buy & Bust not making substantial change
- Street level traffickers feeding their own addictions returning to their clients to sell after release
- Sentencing problematic
- Addicts charged Criminally for possession or trafficking are being released still addicted Circle of Addiction not addressed


Policing Solutions

- Residential Treatment

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

CITY OF RED DEER

- Population of approximately 85,000.
- •Service area population of 150,000.
- •Situated on Highway #2, between Calgary and Edmonton.
- •Growth rate between 3 and 4 percent.

•Communities in surrounding area are growing at faster rate (Blackfalds – 46% between 2001 to 2006).







POLICE SERVICE

- •135 Member on organizational chart-actual 109.
- Support staff of 56 Municipal employees
- •Bylaw support services working side by side with police officers.
- •55,000 calls for service.







HOMELESSNES

- •Approximately 200 homeless persons in community.
- •Criminality vs. Social issue.
- •Community expectations.
- •Community education.
- •Police response.
- •Mental Health undercurrent to issue.







Social Agencies/Programs

•Numerous agencies – coordination of efforts being recognized.

•Provide shelter, but also try and provide opportunity to access assistance.

•People Places/Safe Harbor/Meadowview/ Winter Inn/Churches.

•Support for Winter Shelter through support from Alberta Government Ministery of Housing.







Mayor's Task Force on Homelessnes

- •Established in 2005.
- •65% of persons identified as homeless were between ages of 25 and 44.
- •Gapping in the 18 to 25 year olds-portion that are homeless.
- •Over two hundred community members, and agencies involved in Task Force.
- •Homeless being the newly employed and new to the community.







- •Involved with various committees, agencies in addressing the issue.
- •Parks Bylaw Officer dealing with homeless persons in the Parks.
- •Pamphlet-instructions to officers of the various agencies available to help
- •Development of team (police/social agency) to deal with social issues/policing.
- •Domestic Violence-our experience





Red Deer MOVING FORWARD

- Development of Community Team.
- •Implications for other agencies based on Domestic Violence experience.
- •Expansion of use of Bylaw with second Parks Position.
- •Continued communication/education with Officers/Bylaw and Community.
- •CPTED







SUMMARY

- •We are not alone in dealing with this issue.
- •Positive support from City Hall, Mayor Morris Flewwelling's Task Force-it is a community issue and a priority in the community.
- •Reinforces the value that each agency brings to solution coordinating of efforts.

 This rises to 36% when only those calls where contact was made with an involved party are considered


 In some areas of the city almost half of all contact calls involved a person who was mentally ill







