



HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS

Streets Alive Mission

Streets Alive Mission runs 13 supportive programs for marginalized populations / low income or homeless individuals. Two of these programs are:

Takin' it to the Streets: A sandwich bus that provides sandwiches, coffee, and other food to homeless and those living in downtown, low income apartment buildings.

- 22,905 sandwiches distributed (Jan 1 July 31 2016)
- Approximately 50,000 sandwiches were handed out in 2015

P.I.N. (Persons in Need) Bank: Free clothing is provided to people in need.

- 31: average number of people served daily
- 9296: number of items given in 2015

Social Housing in Action (SHIA)

An initiative of the City of Lethbridge that works with many community organizations and partners to "Bring Lethbridge Home." In 2015–16 their coordinated efforts housed 152 individuals.

Individuals who were housed in 2015-16 reported that their day-to-day life was impacted by one or more significant issue or condition:

- 11.2% reported living with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) 18.4% reported being released from a correctional facility
- 8.6% reported being released from a mental health facility
- 9.2% reported being released from a health facility
- 11.2% reported being released from a residential treatment facility

YWCA: Hidden Treasures

Hidden Treasures is a YWCA program that provides gently used clothing and household items for women once they are ready to leave the shelter. (The number of women helped is limited to the number of donations that the program receives.)

FOOD BANKS

Food bank usage was up marginally across Canada in 2015, but the picture in Alberta was a stark contrast, with an increase of more than 23% over 2014. According to national *HungerCount* statistics, Alberta experienced the highest jump nationally with a record 67,443 people accessing a food bank during the month of March. The national increase in food bank use was just 1.3%.

According to the Hunger Count 2015, 16 Food Banks in Southwestern Alberta served 5,049 individuals in 2015, 40% of which were children under the age of 18. This number is up 14% from the 2014 statistics.

2015 Regional Food Bank Statistics

- The Claresholm Food Bank distributed 1,000 hampers 800 to families and approximately 200 children
- Coaldale Food Bank distributed 506 hampers to 2,015 clients, 555 of which were children
- Lethbridge Food Bank distributed 7,046 hampers to 10,078 adults and 6,513 children.
- Interfaith Food Bank distributed 7,531 hampers to 10,590 adults and 7,635 children.
- Nanton distributed 374 hampers to 122 adults and 59 children
- Pincher Creek Food Bank distributed hampers to 1,791 adults and 1,639 children
- Taber Food Bank 2,075 hampers 3,768 adults and 2,291 children
- Vauxhall and Area Food Bank distributed (Lori) 37 hampers to 71 adults and 82 children
- Vulcan Regional Food Bank 268 hampers to 489 adults and 273 children

Ready Set Go - Lethbridge

- Started in 2013 in Lethbridge by Tracey Erickson-Driscoll and Desiree L'Heureux in collaboration with other "Back to School" initiatives. Designed to be "proactive" and enable kids to get the supplies they need before the start of the school year.
- 40: Community agencies and service providers attend the event
 - o 2013: 400 youth, children and families invited to attend
 - o 2014: 750 youth, children and families invited to attend expanded to Fort MacLeod
 - 2015: 1160 youth, children and families invited to attend
 – expanded to Brooks and Medicine
 Hat
 - o 2016: 1,150 youth, children and families invited to attend

Pincher Creek Care Bears Society

The Pincher Creek Care Bears Society is a non-profit group funded by the Town and MD of Pincher Creek and through public donations that transports passengers to Calgary and Lethbridge for medical appointments.

Claresholm and District Transportation Society

The Claresholm & District Transportation Society provides affordable and accessible transportation for seniors and those with disabilities.

- Expanded service to Vulcan in January 2015 and made 100 trips in their first 12 months and average 10 per month in 2016.
- 7: vehicles (4 rear ramp loaders, 2 seven passenger vans and 1 twenty-nine passenger bus)
- 8: paid drivers
- Now transport passengers to Brooks and Medicine Hat for medical appointments, in addition to trips to High River, Okotoks, Calgary and Lethbridge.
